In the past week alone four staff members have experienced a bereavement of a close family member. We know that many of our parents will be experiencing the same sad and difficult times too. Why am I telling you this? Simply to say that if a different adult has greeted your child for a few days...if your child's reading record has not been checked... if an expected intervention hasn't happened for your child... please understand
